


Cyr - Saint Cyrus: Dream

In the early morning of 12th of October I had a dream about a woman I know with the last name of Cyr. She told me that her name was derived or shortened when her family entered America from the original sir name Cyrus to Cyr and explained her ancestors came from France. She further associated herself with Saint Cyrus in the conversation.

In the short dream I had that night following this conversation, I saw the name Cyr then Cyrus and the date 1611. Upon awakening, I could not make the connection. After an initial search, it was of course the year of the publishing of the King James Version of the bible as a Protestant translation into common English. This suggested to me the link between 1611 and Cyrus was a reformation event. After continued searching, 1611 was the same year Oratories were seen to be founded in France to begin to teach secular education led by the founding of the Bérullian Oratory by the Jesuits in 1611. Here was the event date from which other events would follow.

The opposing school or Oratory of Port-Royal, France against the Jesuits became associated with the ideals of the protesting Jansenists. The main voice of opposition to the Jesuits in this school was Jean Duvergier de Hauranne who was the abbé de Saint-Cyran (Abbot of Saint Cyran). Abbot Cyran opened the



Oratory and became associated with the teachings of both Augustine in emphasizing the doctrine of the 'free will of man' and the ideals of the founder of the Jansenism, Cornelius Otto Jansen. Jansen violently opposed the papacy and especially the military methods and teachings of the Jesuits.

The name Cyrus originates with Saint Cyrus who was a Coptic bishop and physician who founded a 'hospital' located about 12 miles west of Alexandria in Egypt. He was later martyred by Rome along with his co-worker John and a woman along with her three virgin daughters in 304 AD who assisted them in the hospital.

The interpretation of this dream may be considered a personal prophecy but could and should also applied to anyone who has a similar mission. The connections are as followings:

1. The event occurred in France circa 1611.
2. The event related to the mission of Saint Cyrus of 304 as a Physician (healer) who gave his life for the faith.
3. The mission also encompassed the work of Jean Duvergier de Hauranne who was the abbé de Saint-Cyran and founded the Oratory of Port-Royal, France.
4. The event was focused on secular education (healing??) and opposed the controls of the Papacy

and the Jesuits.

Based on the connections, it may be correctly concluded that the message of this dream is a call in a medical field (alternative healing) in providing education and training to others in this field in opposing the controls of the Papacy and specifically the Jesuits who are in league with the drug companies who oppose natural remedies. That being said, the focus is to learn to be a healer by employing natural remedies and to also teach or disciple others to do the same.
